SBRWGA General Meeting

Date: Mar 12, 2019 Time: 1:00 to 2:30 p.m.

President Jean Cheszek called the meeting to order. 39 members were in attendance (Exhibit A).

OLD BUSINESS

MEETING MINUTES: The Nov 24th meeting minutes are posted on the website.

NEW BUSINESS

- 4. **TEAM SHIRTS**. It was decided that we will wait for the release of the 2020 spring collection (August) to choose a coordinated group of golf attire for team wear. B Simms is the coordinator.

5. **EVENTS**:

- a. <u>Club Championship</u>: is coming up on April 1st and 2nd. The entrance fee s \$25. The sponsor for this event is Life is Good Chiropractic.
- b. <u>Member/Guest</u>: Scheduled for May 6 & 7. The all-inclusive cost is \$100 pp. M Hawkins announced the theme will be "Diamonds in the Rough". The event will start on Monday at

4 p.m. with a putting contest and a scavenger hunt through the model homes, followed by appetizers and no-host bar in the Bistro. Event organizers will find a guest for everyone who wishes to participate. Any non-SBRWGA member with a valid handicap can be invited as a guest.

- c. <u>Sadie Hawkins & Member/Member</u>: Players will not be allowed to team up with the same partner as last year.
- d. Katchina Cup: The next event will be held April 16 at the Highlands—Dove Mountain (\$68)
- 6. ALTERNATIVE TEE MODEL: J Cheszek opened the discussion. She and Mike Jahaske will be going out this week to look at the possible Gold tee box placements (the gold tees for holes 13 and 18 are still up for debate). She also introduced the USGA's definition of a bogie woman golfer, and provided the recommended tees based on driving distance to encourage members to choose the tee that fits their game (as follows):

T Kelly introduced names of Committee members who developed the proposed model (G Ohanian, D Taylor, M Timberlake, M Snowden, J Osterlund, J Deyoung, S Pharr, S Gaskill, C Culver, L Smith, T Kelly, Chair). Both shorter and longer alternative tee positions were considered, as were "age plus handicap" rules, and tee position assignments based on handicap. Some local clubs were canvassed and the results were presented to the committee as part of their deliberations. (Other courses have implemented, or are planning to install for forward tees.) The <u>original</u> model presented to the BOD can be seen as Exhibit C.

The meeting was opened for discussion and comment, which resulted in a <u>revision</u> (Exhibit D), to be presented to the membership for an on-line vote.

Exhibit C - ORIGINAL Alternative Tee Model Proposal

MODEL for MIXED TEES During LEAGUE PLAY

- The PLUM tee will remain the default tee position for all SBRWGA tournaments, special events, and team play days. With the number of events and team play days per year, the choice of playing an alternative tee will occur, on average, only twice per month.
- 2. The tee options during regular play days will be limited to the following 3 positions:

a. Plum/Gold blended slope/rating = 66.4 / 104
b. Plum slope/rating = 68.7 / 109
c. Plum/Rust blended slope/rating = 69.5 / 115

- Players may choose their tee position from among the three <u>without qualification</u>. All tee positions are open to all members regardless of handicap.
- 4. Members must <u>declare</u> from which tee they will play at the start of the season or when they join. They must commit to this tee position until the start of the next quarter (Jan, April, July, Oct., to coincide with a new "ringers" award period). A player may make <u>one</u> change of tee position during the year at the beginning of a new quarter, and she must remain there through the <u>end of the year</u>. The only exception concerns players returning after a debilitating illness, injury or surgery. During her recovery period, and excluding tournaments or special events, she may play a more forward of the 3 approved tee positions until her condition improves, or she opts to make a permanent change. Exceptions to the commitment period will be handled on a case-by-case basis.
- 5. The flights (for prizes) will continue to be based on the number of players in the field. Every effort will be made to flight the field according to tee positions; however there will be times when there are too few players on a blended position to comprise a separate flight. In such cases, they will be included in the plum flight and an additional course <u>rating adjustment</u>* will be applied in the form of additional strokes added or subtracted.

Explanation: When a player moves from one set of tees to another, an adjustment to her course handicap is made that reflects the difference in <u>slope</u> between the two tees. Players moving to a more forward tee will see a <u>reduction</u> in their handicap, and those moving back will see an increase.

*An additional <u>rating adjustment</u> is required only if she continues to compete against players teeing from the plum—this number is the difference in ratings between the two tees. (USGA 3-5).

Example: Player 8 below has a plum course HC of 32. If she plays from the G/P tees her HC will be 30. If she competes for prizes with plum tee players her course HC will be further reduced to 28 (adjusted by difference in rating which is 68.7-66.4=2.3, rounded to 2). Likewise, player 3 will have her HC go up from 17 to 18 if she plays from the plum/rust tees, and a rating adjustment will further increase it to 19 (calculated as 68.7-69.5=0.8, rounded to 1).

Exhibit D – REVISED Alternative Tee Model Proposal

- 1. The PLUM tee will remain the default tee position in 2019 for the Club Championship and State Medallion play days.
- 2. Four tee positions will be available as follows:

a. Gold slope/rating = 68.9 / 99
 b. Plum/Gold blended slope/rating = 66.4 / 104
 c. Plum slope/rating = 68.7 / 109
 d. Plum/Rust blended slope/rating = 69.5 / 115

- 3. Players who have a <u>handicap index greater than 20</u> can elect to play from the Gold tees. Using the March league statistics, 61 members of 76 total would qualify to play from the gold tees.
- 4. Members must <u>declare</u> from which tee they will play at the start of the season or when they join. They must commit to this tee position until the start of the next quarter (Jan, April, July, Oct., to coincide with a new "ringers" award period). A player may make <u>one</u> change of tee position during the year at the beginning of a new quarter, and she must remain there through the <u>end of the year</u>.

The only exception concerns players returning after a debilitating illness, injury or surgery. During her recovery period, and excluding tournaments designated as Plum Tees only, she may play a more forward tee position until her condition improves, or she opts to make a permanent change. Exceptions to the commitment period will be handled on a case-by-case basis.

5. If ratified, the model will go into effect April 1, 2019. There will be no trial period.

Questions:

- 1. How does this affect the weekly flights for prize payouts? Each week, the field will be broken into flights based on each player's handicap.index without regard to the tees being played. Flights will be set when scorecards are sent out. Any late cancellations will decrease the number in that person's flight, and late additions will be slotted into the appropriate flight based on her handicap index.
- 2. How does my choice of tee affect my handicap? Your handicap index is a measure of your skill and will generally not change as you play different tees. The <u>USGA Handicap Manual</u> details how handicaps for competitions are calculated.
 - a. The first part of the calculation is based on the course "Slope" rating, which is a measure of the difficulty of the course for a "bogey" golfer. The basic formula is (handicap index) * (Course Slope) / 113. Each tee has a different Slope rating, so each tee box will have a different course handicap for a given golfer.
 - b. The second part of the calculation is necessary because we'll be competing from different tees. To determine the <u>competition handicap</u>, each person's course handicap (from step a) is adjusted by the difference in the <u>course rating</u> between the tees. We will use the Plum tees as the base tee and all other tees will result in the <u>person's handicap being adjusted up or down</u>. The adjustments are: Rust/Plum tees +1, Plum/Gold tees -2, Gold tees -5. (See <u>section 3-5 of the USGA Handicap Manual</u>)
 - c. The table below shows examples of these calculations for different handicap indices. We will be using the competition handicap for our play days.
- 3. How does this affect my ESC or "Max. hole score" for handicap purposes? Your Equitable Stroke Control score is based on your course handicap not your competition handicap. For example, Player 3 playing the gold tees has a course handicap of 20 so her ESC score is 8 on any hole.
 - 4. OK. Just show me the numbers:
