February Maintenance Schedule

In February, no special maintenance is scheduled; but, it is a time when the crew will have more time to trim desert areas and maintain the border strip along resident property where it joins to the golf course due to less turf to mow. This extra time can quickly be eroded as we have a very busy course which limits how much the crew can get done while golfers are present. Also,

many special events require more set up time and can also use more space on the course.

The holes earmarked for the new tee structures are #11, #12, #15, and #9 or #17. Chris will begin the work soon; so there will be some piles of soil being placed as well as workers shaping the areas. These areas will be marked GUR, and you will be entitled to free relief for lie, stance, and swing.

Artificial Turf Range Tee

We will be using the artificial turf tee on the range periodically to allow the natural turf time to heal. Besides giving us a good surface to hit off while the natural turf is healing, it also allows for warm up with out being affected by frost.

One issue that does arise, however, is what to do for teeing the ball up when hitting the driver or fairway woods. The artificial turf will hold a tee up, but only has a depth of about one inch, so the typical 2-3/4" tee is too long. Some players are causing safety issues for themselves and others by moving up onto the natural turf as there is a potential to hit the brick pavers that surround the artificial turf or by moving too far forward and putting themselves and others in reach of mishit shots.

To solve this problem we sell 1-1/2" tees in the pro shop. They work quite well and create the perfect teeing height for drivers!

Dormant Fairway Questionnaire

This winter we are testing and promoting the dormant fairway option to improve summer turf conditions in the fairway. A questionnaire was created to help evaluate how the golfer perceives the aesthetics and playability of the dormant painted fairway. Questionnaires are available on the resident Chelsea home page and in the pro shop. We encourage you to fill out the questionnaire multiple times throughout the next 12 months as we move through the seasons and you experience this evolving concept. Your feedback will be an important part of the data we gather to access the process going forward.

Golf Course Tree Placement

If you see tall orange stakes on holes #7 and #18, they are potential locations for planting trees. The trees would be used to help guide the golfer to play the hole as designed. The golf operation, greens committee, and local homeowners (those that live on #7 and #18 and are affected by the potential locations of new trees) are working together to evaluate these placements. Some golfers have commented on the placement with concern that they may have to play the hole differently and that the hole may become more difficult to play. I would ask everyone to consider different choices in club or tee box before evaluating the changes proposed. Our hope is to enhance the enjoyment of the course as well as help direct shots toward the center of the golf hole lowering the potential for golf balls ending up in home sites.

Golf Tip of the Month

The Science of Ball Mark Repair

The title of this article either peaked your interest or caused you to quickly move on. Talking about ball marks is usually relegated to finger pointing about who made them but didn't fix them. This article is more for those who already make the effort to fix their ball mark (and hopefully one extra!).

If you are making the effort to repair ball marks, it is important to do it in a fashion that is both lasting and allows the turf to remain in a level healthy state.

The biggest mistake made when repairing ball marks is to lift the turf upwards. This creates an unsupported pocket under the area and also tears the roots of the turf. The results are a ball mark that sinks back down after a night's watering and a dead patch of turf where the ball mark was.

To fix a ball mark and avoid this scenario, repair the area in this fashion:

- 1. Working from the OUTSIDE edge using a tee or ball mark repair tool: PUSH DOWN and IN towards the center.
- 2. Continue around the outside of the ball mark, pushing the "outer rim of the crater" DOWN and IN.
- 3. Finish by lightly tapping the area with the bottom of your putter .

Remember to repair your ball mark and one other on every green!
