### Golf Maintenance Schedule

A maintenance plan is put into place at the beginning of the year. Variance in weather and agronomic conditions may require changes to the schedule.

#### February Maintenance Schedule

We will continue closing one hole per nine to cart traffic to help maintain the quality of the turf. We will continue our program of resting the natural turf one week per month, except in December and January, when it will be rested for two weeks in those months due to the slowing of the growth rate of the rye overseed.

The Bermuda turf is slowing down and will go fully into dormancy following our first frost.

Please support our maintenance staff by filling divots with sand and repairing ball marks on the green. Cart traffic is highly damaging to the turf, so please limit time on the turf as much as possible.

We will delay tee times for one hour two days a month to help facilitate painting the course. Painting will be done on regular weekday tee time days (Mon, Wed, or Fri).

Back Nine morning nine hole times will not be available on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday on a year-round basis to allow maintenance time to complete weekly tasks.

# Free Monthly Golf Clinic

Every month Mike and Ken will conduct a free golf clinic. All residents and their guests are welcome to attend, and there is no cost. Please sign up in the Pro Shop. The staff have a book behind the counter with all the scheduled clinics that you can sign up for. You are welcome to attend as often and as many as you like! The clinics will cover basic technique and mechanics of each topic and are great for learning a new skill or brushing up a skill that needs some work.

#### Golf Course Access

When using a "ball grabber" attached to the end of a putter to extract a ball from the cup, please remove the flagstick first to eliminate the potential for damage to the edge of the turf surrounding the cup. Thank you.

# Golfing News Cont.

#### Cart Rules

The following rules shall apply to all types of golf carts, both rental and privately-owned:

- DRIVE ON CART PATH until even with ball, then enter turf at 90° when gates are not present.
- SCATTER ACROSS TURF until ball is on green.
- EXIT TURF at 90° to cart path.
- REMAIN ON CART PATH on all Par-3 holes.
- STAY 25 FEET from tees and greens.
- DO NOT DRIVE around sides or back of greens.
- DO NOT DRIVE in the desert.
- DO NOT ENTER private resident property to retrieve golf balls.

#### **Ball Marks**

Our greens have been in service for a little over one year now. Aaron and his crew are doing a great job keeping them smooth and fast. To do our part as golfers, we should make every effort to keep ball marks repaired! Ball marks that are repaired immediately heal faster and create less surface disruption resulting in a smooth green. Let's do our part to keep the greens looking good! Please remember to stay in the habit of finding and repairing ball marks on the greens to help keep them rolling smoothly.

#### Pace of Play

Please follow these simple tips to improve pace of play without having to rush around the course:

- 1. Be prepared to play your shot while waiting for others to hit, so you can play immediately without delay. This includes shots played while on the putting green.
- 2. Clean and replace your club in the bag; and record your score, at the next tee, not at the green.
- 3. Hit a provisional ball when appropriate, and limit searches for lost balls to 3 minutes. Players in the group that can hit safely should do so; while those that can't, should help search.
- 4. Limit socializing to periods when you are prepared to hit and there is a wait to safely hit.

Have fun on the course, and keep your play efficient, so all can experience an enjoyable pace of play!

#### Cart Damage to the Course

Without question, cart traffic is the number one cause of damage to the turf on the course. Please do your best to limit the time your cart is on the turf. One easy way to do that is by staying on the cart path until even with your drive. This simple tip can reduce wear and tear exponentially because entering the turf area early is the most common mistake made by golfers in terms of course damage.

### Rules Question of the Month

We begin our new monthly rules question of the month feature this month. See below for our inaugural question!

Q: If my ball is off the putting green, before I make my stroke, can I repair a ball mark or other damage that is on my line of play to the hole?

A: NO, if the ball mark or turf damage is also off the putting green, as that would be improving your line of play and would incur a two-stroke penalty. However, YES, you can repair the damage if the ball mark or turf damage is on the putting green.

### Golf Maintenance News

#### Irrigation Efficiency

It's February! I know it's hard to believe with the temperatures we've had the past month, but it's time to start thinking about the spring green up of the Bermudagrass. This doesn't mean actively growing Bermudagrass, but it does mean that the Bermuda is going to start greening up and sending out shoots in search of the sunlight as the days grow longer.

I'm very pleased that with the current course conditions being supportive, we are staged for an incredible spring season. Next month I'll talk more in depth about what we do to get ready for spring time; but for now, I want to continue with last month's topic of water conservation. I'd like to highlight some of our practices that we use here on a daily basis to improve irrigation efficiency and conserve water.

A majority of the agronomic practices we do throughout the year and most importantly during our summer closures is to aid and improve on water infiltration into the soils and reducing runoff.

- Aerification to remove thatch and create water channels for the water to enter the soil.
- Thatch reduction aerification, sand topdressing greens and fairways, verticutting. The use of organic fertilizers to stimulate soil microbes and break down thatch.
- Soil wetting agents and penetrants products we either spray or inject through the irrigation system to aid in the infiltration of water.
- Proper mowing heights reduce stress to the plants and use less water.

- Staying up to date on irrigation technologies and implementation on the golf course.
- ⇒ Last summer we replaced our 17 year old central irrigation computer/software with the latest technology from Toro Irrigation, the Lynx Central Control System. We can adjust individually the run time for every sprinkler on the golf course, and our course has over 1,700 of them.
- ⇒ We have the various parts of the golf course and driving range broken down into 38 individual programs; for example, fairways 1-9 and fairways 10-18, in these programs we have the ability to turn off individual fairways when desired and adjust the run time for each fairway as well.
- ⇒ The system will cancel nightly irrigation when we have received a set amount of rain, and we have the ability to access the irrigation remotely from home.
- ⇒ Our sprinkler run times are determined by the Lynx central computer. This uses our weather station information near #4 tees. The computer generates what is called the Evapotranspiration rate (ET). This determines how long each sprinkler runs based on the weather data for the past 24 hours. For detailed info on ET, here's a link ETo Evapotranspiration (arizona.edu)
- ⇒ For greens water management we use moisture meters (Field Scott TDR 350) that give the percentage of moisture in the greens profile. Ideal percentages are between 20%-25%. If the readings fall below 20%, then we know it's time to water the greens.
- Constant monitoring of the course for irrigation issues ensuring the irrigation system is adjusted and operating properly.
- ⇒ Besides myself, Roger and Daniel are constantly looking for irrigation issues. Most importantly, we have two irrigation technicians; Sergio on the front 9 and Myles on the back 9. The irrigation techs are continuously adjusting the rotation of the sprinklers, replacing broken/worn parts and fixing leaks.
- Use of reclaimed water. On average we receive 90,000 110,000 gallons of reclaimed water from our onsite
  waste water treatment facility on the west side of the property.
- ⇒ By using the reclaimed water we are returning it back to the hydrologic cycle. The reclaimed water is used by the turfgrass and then returned back to the atmosphere. Any runoff or excess water is filtered through the turf system and soil and then returns back to the aquafer.
